Rise and Shine - It's Back to School Time

Teachers at the James E. Davis School welcomed their students to the new academic year which began on August 12. The school is accredited by the Indiana Department of Education and academic credits transfer to any public school in the state.

The school offers students in grades 6-12 a quality education. Students are given course work in math, science, social studies, physical education, art and language arts. The classroom sizes are kept small in order to provide students with individualized attention.

Respect, Responsibility and Productivity are the three behavior core values at the school. "We strive to make meaningful connection with our students and

encourage them to see the relationship between their choices, their consequences and their quality of life," added Principal Jim Stuart

The school has adopted the Teaching Family model as its primary tool for providing behavior support to students. The model is a fully integrated approach to providing humane, effective individualized treatment and service to students. As one of the students stated, "I was nervous on the first day of school but the teachers were super nice. I liked the fact that there were only five other students in my math class. So, I have a feeling that algebra will be easier for me since I will get more attention from Mrs. Morris, my math teacher."



One of the greatest joys at the school is when our students graduate. We had eight students graduate in May of 2019. It is anticipated four of our recent graduates will attend post-secondary education. To learn more about the school, visit iumch.org.

Finding Solace in the Garden

Finding solace in ordinary tasks like gardening can be very therapeutic when people are grieving.

Many of our youth face the death of a loved one while living at the Home. Recently, Rachel Alstott, Spiritual Life Leader, had a vision to plant a grief garden where youth can go and find peace and comfort after the death of a friend or family member.

The youth have the opportunity to plant a flower or tree in the memory of a loved one. For instance, Mary's grandmother died a few weeks ago and she struggled with grief. Mary's grandmother loved sun flowers so she planted some in her memory. Now, Mary can sit in the garden and find comfort and peace.

The garden will continue to grow. In fact, the Auxiliary voted to use some of their funds to help support the garden. More flowers will be purchased, along with a privacy fence and some additional seating. The youth also help maintain the garden by watering the plants and spreading dirt and mulch.

It provides more than just counseling therapy and academic education. Their program helps youth learn how a healthy family functions by sharing together in meal preparation, household chores, and much more. The Teaching Family model prepares them for a better life."

The Ottjes enjoy life in northern Indiana. Jim, now retired, owned a successful heating and cooling business in Bluffton and Karen serves at minister of Uniondale United Methodist Church. When reflecting on the Home and why they give, Karen and Jim both believe that one of America's greatest needs is to raise youth to become productive members of society. Karen added, "It makes us feel good that we are a part of helping these youth become responsible citizens. We feel good about the fact that we are changing the trajectory of their lives."

Rachel Alstott is the Home's new Spiritual Life Leader and she is making a positive impact on the youth. "I spend many hours talking to them one-on-one and help guide them through some difficult times. One of my greatest pleasures is leading the youth to baptism," Rachel stated.

During the summer, four youth were baptized in Gress Chapel on the Home's campus and several more are to be baptized in September. Reverend Marsha Hutchinson, a member of the Home's Board of Trustees, typically performs the baptisms.

Before the youth are baptized, Rachel conducts a class on the significance of the ritual. She covers the history of baptism, the significance of the water, the meaning of baptism and how it is celebrated. She also emphasizes the importance of Matthew 28:19 which is typically read during

According to Jenna, "I will never forget how I felt when Rev. Hutchinson put the water on my head. I was glad my parents came and I think the whole campus was there, too. It was one of the best days I've had in a long time."

A Higher Calling

Lawrence and Pamela Williams are Family Teachers in Home 5. They have vast experience in the Teaching Family model. Most recently, they served as Family Teachers at Father Flannigan's Boy's Town in Omaha, Nebraska.

The Williams are responsible for the care and well-being of 10 teenage boys ranging in age from 17 to 19. Family Teachers provide daily care, supervision and teach youth important social skills and functional alternatives to behaviors that caused them to be placed out of their own home. They also teach independent living skills and help with academic skills so youth can perform better in school and prepare for a career.

"It's a higher calling for us. We love these boys as if they were our own children. The Teaching Family model is the key to their success. The boys are thriving in school and are successful in their work environments. We see their progress first-hand and are honored to be a part of it," said Lawrence.
