



In Memoriam WILLIAM A. SIGMAN, June 21, 1928 - May 3, 2020

It is with sadness that we share news of the passing of William (Bill) A. Sigman, a 28-year member of the Board of Trustees of Indiana United Methodist Children's Home. Most recently, Bill served on the Indiana United Methodist Children's Home Foundation Board of Directors.

Bill was chairperson of the Home's Buildings and Grounds Committee during major building renovations and new construction. He was a key advisor during the 2015 construction of the James E. Davis School building. During the building dedication service, he said, "The new school reaches all three of my criteria; safety for the children, energy efficiency and beauty." To honor Bill, the café in the school was named in his honor.

"Bill's legacy is the absolute beauty of our 17-acre campus," said Foundation President Mo Thomas. "Bill wanted each child who arrives on our campus to feel safe, know that they are valued and find inspiration to work toward an independent life. Our tranquil park-like campus, family-style homes and modern school building set the stage for our youth to find success. We are grateful for Bill's dedication to our children."

Bill was a member of St. Luke's United Methodist Church in Indianapolis and was an active leader in numerous civic organizations.

Bill served on the Home's Building and Grounds Committee for many years. He attended the ground breaking ceremony of our Independent Living homes in 2018.

Our Lent Challenge 2020 was a success. Thanks to generous donors, the \$75,000 campaign goal was met. During the Lenten Season, friends of the Home were asked to make financial donations using funds they would have spent for activities or items they gave up for the season. For instance, Bishop Trimble gave up coffee and donated proceeds to the Lenten Challenge.

Funds raised during the campaign will go toward the Home's Independent Living space. To best serve the youth, a current recreation space will be transformed into a lab for the Independent Living curriculum.

The purpose of the space is to inspire group learning and independent study. "We want to ensure our youth have the tools they need to become productive members of society. It is likely their last childhood placement is at the Home and we want to give them the best skills possible for living on their own," stated Rich Lapinski, Executive Director/CEO.

On May 5, the Home also participated in the Covid-19 Giving Tuesday Now. Through a one-day social media drive, Indiana United Methodist Children's Home Foundation reached out to donors to help the Home with Covid-19 unexpected needs. The goal was surpassed thanks to our donors. A generous matching gift was received from the Searles Akers Wealth Management Group from Merrill Lynch.

Since youth at the Home have been isolated for several weeks, many have cabin fever. This has caused stress and fear for our youth who already suffer from trauma due to abuse and neglect. The good news is there are some simple but important strategies to address their critical needs and that's where the Covid-19 Day of Giving helps. Funds raised will help purchase bikes, helmets, recreational equipment, fishing poles/tackle and Fitbits.

Foundation Scholarship Awarded for Post Secondary Education

Jo is a Hoffman Family Scholarship recipient and she is currently enrolled at Empire Beauty College. She lives in one of the Independent Living homes and is taking some on-line classes during Covid-19 isolation. She practices hair styling skills on some of the girls as well as on her mannequins.

"My dream is to open a salon someday. Receiving the scholarship for beauty school will help make my dream come true," she said.

Dear Friends,

Earlier this spring I met Abby. She was enjoying the pizza she had just made. Proud that she mastered yeast in her pizza dough, she was all smiles that sunny day on the Children's Home campus. But her past was dark. She experienced a very traumatic early childhood. She described how she had no control over her past behavior.

"I did not understand why I was acting out. It was horrible and made me feel bad about myself."

She has lived at our Home for nearly two years, has made outstanding progress and is making plans for her future.

"I wasn't on track when I first arrived at the Home. I didn't know what to do or what to expect or who to trust. My Family Teachers kind of took me under their wings and helped me through those first few weeks. Fast forward to where I am today. I feel safe. I was able to pull my grades up and am on track to graduate in May 2021. I'd like to give credit to my Family Teachers for giving me guidance. They stood by me through some rocky times and it wasn't always easy but look at where I am today!"

Abby's Family Teachers, Chrissy and Donnae Benjamin, are very proud of Abby's progress. Chrissy shared, "Witnessing the transformation in Abby is the reason why we do what we do. As Family Teachers, we go through a lot of training. We've seen firsthand how Abby has transformed from a very sad and troubled soul, to a young lady who now has the confidence and intelligence to lead a very productive life."

Thanks to loyal support from our churches and donors like you, we can share God's love and proven strategies of the Teaching Family Model with Abby and other children in crisis.

Temporary \$300 Charitable Deduction for 2020 Tax Year

A temporary charitable deduction has been enacted for 2020 through the President's CARES Act to encourage charitable donations. This deduction will allow taxpayers who do not currently itemize their deductions to claim a charitable deduction for cash donations up to \$300 through December 31. The \$300 cap applies to individuals and married couples equally, i.e., a married couple would not be able to take a \$600 deduction. Consider a tax deductible gift to the Children's Home today.

Love Makes All Things Grow

A grant made possible by The Garden Community Church in Indianapolis, will enable the Home's grief garden to sustain its beauty.

Sole credit for the concept of the grief garden goes to Rachel Alstott, Spiritual Life Leader. "I had a vision for sacred space where youth could go to grieve and heal after the death of a loved one while in our care. Sometimes the grieving process is complicated by the reality that our youth are not able to attend the funeral service since their abuser may be in attendance. To help with their grieving process, youth are encouraged to select and care for a plant in honor of their loved ones," added Rachel.

The grant will help sustain the garden's beauty and will help purchase garden tools, weed screening, flowers/plants, wood stain for the fence and some outdoor seating.

As part of the grant, the Home will partner with the congregation and help with their community outreach project. Members of the church have a community garden in Indianapolis benefitting families in need. Sometime this summer, some of our youth will volunteer in the Garden's garden and help with the vegetable plants. On July 11th, members from the church will come to the Home and team up with our youth to work in the grief garden. According to Reverend Dr. Carolyn Scanlan-Holmes, lead pastor of The Garden, "The Home's grief garden in an ideal space to exercise God's love, power and grace. It was our extreme pleasure to help with this meaningful and inspirational project. After all, love makes all things grow."

According to Rachel, "We are always glad to partner with other churches in our community. Plus, our youth have the opportunity to help people in need. It's a great learning experience and it feeds their soul in a very positive way."
