



IUMCH CEO Named President of the Teaching Family Association

Rich Lapinski, IUMCH Executive Director/CEO, was appointed President of the Board of the Teaching Family Association during their 42nd Annual Conference in Cincinnati, Ohio. Rich will work closely with the staff and Board as they set program goals for the next two years. Lapinski will also help plan the Annual Conferences.

The Teaching Family Association was organized in 1975 and represents more than 40 agencies that support common elements of the model of care which focuses on the humane treatment of children and youth. The Teaching Family Model serves a wide range of vulnerable families, physically, emotionally and sexually abused children, delinquent youth, autistic children and adults with disabilities.

Rich has a multitude of experience in the Teaching Family Model. He and his wife, Stephanie, were Family Teachers at Father Flannigan's Boy's Town in Omaha, Nebraska. Rich later became the Executive Director of the Presbyterian Children's Home in Amarillo, Texas and served there for several years. In 2010, Rich was named Executive Director/CEO of Indiana United Methodist Children's Home. Since 2012, six Teaching Family group homes have been built on the 17-acre campus.

"I am extremely humbled to serve as Board President of the Teaching Family Association. I am proud to represent this organization and know how valuable they are to agencies working with children and families in need," stated Rich.

Teaching Family Association Names 2019 Distinguished Practitioner of the Year

Meet Linnea Krasutsky. She is part of the Teaching Family team at Indiana United Methodist Children's Home and was recently named Distinguished Practitioner of the Year during the Annual Teaching Family Association Conference in Cincinnati, Ohio. The international award is given to a Family Teacher for outstanding service to youth.

Linnea is a unique Children's Home employee. Currently, she is instrumental in facilitating the independent living program curriculum. And, Linnea knows first-hand about the struggles our youth face. After all, she was a resident of the Home in 2006 at the age of 14. "Never in my wildest dreams did I think I would actually work at the Home someday. You just never know the path you may take," stated Linnea.

Linnea had a contentious relationship with her mother and was eventually placed at the Home through the Indiana Department of Child Services. It took her a while to adjust to life in the Wesley Home but soon learned to accept the structure and routine. "My fondest memory of living at the Home was going to the canteen on Saturday night. The canteen was a recreational area where we could play games, listen to music and eat snacks. I can still smell the popcorn popping. We had a citizenship program back then and I

eventually earned the highest level which meant I had more privileges," she added.

After Linnea successfully completed the Home's treatment program, she was placed in foster care and lived with a caring family. "It seemed like the Children's Home was very strategic in finding me the perfect foster family that would embrace my interests. For instance, I loved horses and they found me a foster family that lived on a farm. Later, she was adopted by her foster parents and graduated from high school.

A few years after graduation, Linnea began working for Mental Health of Indiana and saw the benefits of providing social services for people in need. A particular staff member was impressed with her knowledge and tenacity. Eventually, she learned about a job at the Children's Home as an Assistant Family Teacher and went through the interview process. "I didn't think they would hire me since I was a former resident and had some rough times there but they had confidence in me and I was hired to work primarily on the night shift. Linnea was later promoted to Independent Living Assistant/ Family Teacher working with older teens as they begin to transition to adult hood. She teaches a variety of independent living skills including budgeting and interviewing skills.

is a loving mother to three young children. "I use some of what I've learned in the Teaching Family model to parent my own children. I can certainly tell that it makes a positive difference in their day-to-day lives."

According to Stacy Youngblood, Residential Supervisor for the Independent Living Homes, "Linnea professionally seeks and implements feedback from Family Teachers and her consultant to grow even stronger in her craft. She effectively uses the motivation system to inspire youth to achieve more, while continuing to make relationships a priority by talking, listening, teaching and having fun. We are so blessed to have her on our staff."

I hope you find joy in knowing that your support gives hope to Jenna and all the youth on our growing campus. We added two new homes this year thanks to the loyal support of our churches and donors. Together we are breaking the cycle of abusive family relationships and teaching a happy and independent way forward.

Merry Christmas to you and your family from our family at the Children's Home and the Home's supporting Foundation! May you find God's blessings during this season of love and sharing.



A Legacy for Trinity UMC

Indiana United Methodist Children's Home (IUMCH) was honored to welcome members of the congregation and guests from Trinity UMC, Crawfordsville to the Home's campus for a first-of-its-kind tree dedication ceremony on October 23rd. The church was established in 1894 and was discontinued in July.

"The Trinity Church leadership saw an opportunity for their 125-year legacy to live-on forevermore," said Christy Huston, Executive Director of the IUMCH Foundation. "We are grateful that they generously shared gifts with the Children's Home Foundation as a tribute to their years of service to God's love and mission to children in need. These generous funds leave a legacy of support to ensure a strong future for the children we serve."

To honor the congregation, the Home and the Indiana United Methodist Children's Home Foundation wanted to do something to create a lasting legacy for the congregation. A Red Jewel Crabapple tree was planted in the Home's grief garden in honor of their ministry.

Tom Campbell, long-time member of the church said, "Discontinuing the

church was a very difficult and sad occasion since many of us grew up there and witnessed an abundance of wonderful stewardship. Even though we ended our relationship with the building, we will continue our devoted relationship with God. The tree planting was so meaningful to us as it helps us heal and we know our legacy will continue at Indiana United Methodist Children's Home, a mission we have supported for many years."



In memory of Trinity UMC, a beautiful Red Jewel Crabapple tree was planted in the grief garden located behind the Home's chapel. Rev. Preserving Our History

Over the years, the United Methodist Women have taken an interest in the Home's history and our founder Miss Angie Godwin. In fact, Susan Stewart, an active member of the church, went on a mission to find where Miss Godwin was buried.

Mission accomplished! Susan visited a cemetery in Greencastle, Indiana and found the Godwin family plot. Miss Godwin was buried near her mother, father and sister. She passed away in 1948 but her legacy continues today. A girl's group home is named after Miss Godwin as well as a giving circle in her
