

Meet the 2021 Indiana Children's Champion Honorees



Indiana United Methodist Children's Home (IUMCH) honored five Hoosier community leaders for providing life-changing hope for children and families in crisis on the 2021 Indiana Children's Champion Day during a virtual celebration via Facebook Live. The honorees were recognized for helping the Children's Home live up to its values of love, family and education.

The 2021 Indiana Children's Champion Honorees:

- **Rev. Jim Gentry** received the *Lifetime Leadership Award* for his vision and his 60 years of exemplary service with the Children's Home;
- **Morris "Mo" E. Thomas, Jr.** also received the *Lifetime Leadership Award* for his vision and nearly 40 years of exemplary service with the Children's Home and more recently with the Foundation;
- **Daryl and Lois Hoffman** received the *Agape Award* for their dedication to sharing love, compassion, healing and giving hope to the youth at the Children's Home;
- **First United Methodist Church, Noblesville** received the *Partner in Christ Award* for their five decades of dedicated service to the Home;
- Retired Marion County Juvenile Court Judge **Marilyn Moores** received the *Advocate Award* for her exemplary impact on children's rights at the Children's Home and throughout Indiana.

The 2021 Indiana Children's Champion Day celebration offered a chance for the Home's leadership to thank individuals and groups for their tremendous support and impact in helping the Children's Home make a difference for so many young people in Indiana.

The virtual event featured an inspirational interview with former resident Chyna Gates. She shared insight into a dysfunctional childhood which led her to the Children's Home. Chyna, a scholarship recipient, also shared highlights of her new life as a college student at IUPUI. One hundred and six years ago, the Home's founder, Miss Godwin, inspired congregations to support the Home's mission. Today, the Home continues to receive unwavering support from churches and related organizations all over Indiana.

Most recently, Christ UMC in Westfield collected \$1,200 in gift cards for the youth at IUMCH. According to Donita Hiatt, member of the church, "We have toured the Home several times and it always makes an impact when we visit. We see how the youth are treated with love and compassion. Having the faith-based component also connects many of us with the Children's Home. It's hard not to be inspired when visiting the campus and meeting the youth and staff."

A group from Waldron UMC invited Susan Bennett, Director of Public Relations, to present a program to their women's circle. During the meeting, they presented a check for \$700 to the Home. Following the presentation, the women wanted to learn more about the Home so they set up a tour in October. One of the leaders of the group stated, "It's good to have someone from the Home visit our church but the impact is even more powerful when visiting the campus. When touring, it is evident that the Home is truly a place for youth to heal in a safe and loving environment. It makes us all proud to support the Home and to know our mission dollars are saving young lives."

Four Graduates...Four Success Stories

“I never thought I would graduate from high school. This is the happiest day of my life,” said Ross. Ross was one of four graduates receiving diplomas during the trimester graduation on November 5th. All four graduates had no hope for the future when arriving at the Home. Their trajectory has changed dramatically thanks to the progress made at the James E. Davis on-grounds school. According to Principal Jim Stuart, “When youth arrive at the Children’s Home, they are often times behind academically two to three grades. I give so much credit to our excellent teaching staff. They do everything possible to give the youth confidence in their school work. Along with patience and tenacity,

we see a growing number of youth graduating from our program. The four graduates today had many hurdles but they were able to make some astonishing progress.”

A highlight of the graduation included the naming of the most recent vocational scholarship recipient. Edna May, Chairperson of the Scholarship Committee and member of the Home’s Board of Trustees, presented Sara with three scholarships – a Hoffman Family Scholarship, a Pulliam Scholarship and a Sue Davis Memorial Scholarship. Sara is using her scholarship funds to receive training in phlebotomy. She currently lives in one of the Independent Living Learning homes and is close to finishing her phlebotomy training. Before getting a full time job she will complete an internship to obtain even more hands-on experience. Sara added, “These scholarships have been so important to me. Although I saved some money, it sure helps to have these funds available to me. I am so grateful to all of the people who made these scholarships available.”

Bobs’ Benches...A Legacy of Love

Two men named Bob...both were servants of the Lord...both loved working with children. One was a school principal, the other a junior high school science teacher. Both Bobs left a legacy their families will cherish forever. And, their lasting legacy will remain at the Children’s Home, as well. Two benches were recently dedicated in their memories by family members and friends.

Ron and Karen Arnold of Columbus, Indiana wanted to pay tribute to their good friend **Bob Welsch (1935-2021)** so they donated funds for the Home to purchase a bench in his memory. Bob taught science for 30 years in Columbus, Indiana. He had an impeccable reputation as a husband, father, grandfather, friend, teacher, church leader and volunteer. According to Ron, “I couldn’t ask for a better friend. Bob and I would make annual trips to the Children’s Home to bring Christmas gifts. We even made it through a blizzard. He loved serving others, especially children. I feel giving this gift was a perfect way to honor my friend who loved serving children.”

Bob Stebbe (1929-2018) also had a bench dedicated in his memory. Mark and Tracy Stebbe of Fishers, Indiana (Bob’s son and daughter-in-law) donated funds for a bench to honor Bob. He had a love for children, having served as a principal for 30 years. He also had a heart for children growing up in difficult situations. During Bob’s childhood, his mother died and Bob lived in two orphanages along the way. According to Mark, “My dad never complained about his childhood. He always showed gratitude. In return, I wanted to pay tribute to such a wonderful father. He had a positive impact on so many people. Tracy and I toured the Children’s Home and were very moved. We had dinner with some of the boys and it had an impact on us and we wanted to support the Home in some way. Naming a bench in my father’s memory was a meaningful way to honor the love he had for all children.”

As Reverend Jim Gentry stated during the Welsch dedication, “In Hebrews, Jesus famously said, ‘Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden and I will give you rest.’ The benches are a place where our youth can rest, reflect and be restored.”

- Hair dryers/curling irons/hair straightener
- Hats and insulated gloves
- Kitchen utensils for Teaching-Family Homes and students leaving for independent living
- Movie theatre gift cards (Goodrich Theatres are in Lebanon or AMC in NW Indianapolis)
- Recreational equipment (basketballs, footballs, outdoor games, soccer balls)
- Wrapping paper and gift bags

What would have become of the children in our care without your support? It is difficult to imagine.

God's grace brought young Chyna Gates to our Home when she needed safety and direction. "Life before coming to the Home was stressful," she told us. She was in our loving care for two years. Now a college student, she has nursing aspirations and direction. She credits our staff for giving her a model for positive change she needed.

"I always had useful skills, but the Home helped me learn valuable lessons, like how to accept help, how to be in a community and taught me coping skills." The college scholarships she receives from the Home today help her manage expenses. We know you join in feeling pride that the Home continues to help Chyna progress toward happiness and independence.

Each year donors like you partner with us, many sharing prayers, volunteer time and financial support. **On the following pages, we celebrate and thank our legacy donors who have included the Home in their estate plan or have shared their intent to do so. Their personal legacy of caring for children in crisis endures.** Because of their commitment, what began as a simple home for orphans in 1915 has grown. And it has changed remarkably. The challenges facing today's children, like abandonment, neglect and abuse, have taken a heavy toll on the youth in our care. Together, we are responding by providing a way forward for young people like Chyna, who otherwise might have been lost.

“During Covid isolation, I began thinking about my own mortality and decided it was time to draft a will with my attorney. It was a simple decision for me to include the Home as a beneficiary.”

She added, “I love hearing the success stories of the youth. Through my charitable giving, I know I am part of their success and that means so much to me.” She added, “My grandfather, Dr. Heedlie Cobb, was a United Methodist minister and he lived by the teachings of John Wesley. He passed Wesley’s wisdom on to my family. Being a member of the John Wesley Circle honors my grandfather and allows me to support a very worthy United Methodist mission.”

2021 Tax Incentives

Under the COVID relief bill, an individual who doesn’t itemize deductions may deduct up to \$300 of charitable contributions made in 2021. A married couple who doesn’t itemize may deduct up to \$600 of charitable contributions made in 2021. Consider a gift to the Children's Home Foundation by December 31 to take advantage of this opportunity.

Appreciated stock held for more than one year, can be the ideal choice for individuals who want their charitable gifts to make the biggest impact for the lowest possible cost.

The **smart** component: **double tax benefits.**

Let’s take a closer look: Suppose Ann gives us 100 shares of stock – purchased ten years ago for \$1,000 – with a current fair market value of \$5,000. Today, Ann can deduct the full \$5,000 on this year’s income tax return if she itemizes. The \$4,000 capital gain is not taxed, even though the gain is quadruple the purchase price. Avoiding capital gains tax and receiving an income tax deduction make it possible to give stock at the lowest possible after-tax cost.

Family Legacy of Caring for Children



Dr. Donna Sandage, an active member of North United Methodist Church in Indianapolis, learned philanthropy from her mother and lives by the words of John Wesley, “Do all the good you can”. Donna continues to honor her mother’s legacy of caring deeply about the Home’s youth by including the Children’s Home in her regular philanthropic giving and also in her will.

As Donna reflected on her family, she stated, “My mother grew up in a divorced home and back in 1915, people were harshly judged when they couldn’t keep the family unit intact. The Methodist Church was one of the few places my mother found acceptance, especially from a Sunday school teacher named Lillie Cooper. My mother wanted to give money to the Home because she was aware of children who grew up in troubled households. She entrusted me with a \$30,000 check several years ago that I handed to Dr. James E. Davis who was executive director at the time,” Donna added.

Donna and her husband John toured the Home and then joined the youth for dinner. Donna and John were both inspired by the Teaching-Family Model and how the youth respond to the care and treatment they receive. Donna stated, “Witnessing this first-hand makes me realize that I want to continue my mother’s legacy by giving to the Home.”

According to Donna, “The model of small group living is impressive.

It’s very home-like and not at all institutional. Children at the Home have their own rooms and share in household chores, including grocery shopping and preparing meals. These skills are vital to young people, many who come from dysfunctional families that often never share meals or create a sense of structure and safety. I admire the Family Teachers who devote their time to caring for and providing role models to teens who often lack those basic life skills.”

Donna spent her career as a public-school teacher and believes in inspiring students to love and appreciate art. Most recently, she donated funds for some of the students to tour the Indianapolis Museum of Art and view the Van Gogh exhibit. She added, “I applaud the art teacher who displays students’ artwork in the hallway at the on-grounds school. Even though the students may be behind in academic skills, they express their creativity through their art.”

When asked why she gives to the Home, Donna replied, “I give to the Home several times a year. I also have it listed in my will to receive part of my estate when I die. I support the Home partly in

honor and memory of my mother. But also, I believe in its mission of giving youth an opportunity to learn life skills beyond academic achievement. These words come from a Phi Beta Kappa with a PhD who had the good fortune of growing up in a supportive, stable home with a secure source of food and security.”

Donna can rest assured that her generosity and the generosity of her mother to the children at the Home will continue in perpetuity, because Donna has included the children’s mission in her will. A beautiful family legacy!
